Thank you for digestive tank

Halifax school is excited to announce the arrival and installation of a food waste digestive tank. In 2012 the state of Vermont enacted the Universal Recycling Law. The Universal Recycling Law is a series of changes taking place throughout the state to reduce our impact on global warming. Most changes are to be made by July of 2020. Some of you may have noticed that plastic shopping bags are now illegal in Vermont, this is a part of the same program.

So why the digestive tank for food?! Food waste is generally thrown into the garbage and ends up in a landfill. Food accounts for a significant part of household waste and can be broken down via aerobic bacteria (bacteria that needs air to survive) when this process happens gases that are released throughout decomposition are molecules that are not starved for oxygen, so they are beneficial or non harmful to our environment. When food is put in a plastic bag and buried, the decomposition creates gas from anaerobic bacteria (doesn't need air). Molecules are starved for oxygen thus making carbon monoxide and methane. The release of these molecules that are starved of oxygen are detrimental to the ozone layer. This tank is modeled after solar cones and will receive all food scraps generated from our students. Through the powers of aerobic bacteria the food will be broken down. Ninety-eight percent of the food waste will turn to liquid and be absorbed into the ground, the rest will develop into a hard cake like organic substance that can easily be introduced back into our environment.

- Adam Buursma and Green Foam Insulation for storage of tank while it was being worked on, insulated the tank at cost, and transported it to the school
- Brad Rafus and the Halifax Town crew for finding time in a very busy schedule to dig, set, and backfill the tank.

If anyone has some thoughts or ideas please share them with us.

Nurses Reminder:

It is that time of the year when colds, flu and stomach bugs abound, so please read over the following guidelines on when to have your child remain at home.

GUIDELINES OF WHEN TO KEEP YOUR CHILD HOME- DUE TO ILLNESS

- Fever of 100 or above- children need to be fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever reducing medication before returning to school
- If the student has been on **antibiotics for less than 24 hours** requires to be on an antibiotic for 24 hours before returning to school
- Diarrhea or Vomiting in the last 24 hours
- Fever with a rash
- Eye Discharge/Pink Eye/Bacterial Conjunctivitis- thick green/yellow eye drainage may be contagious, if diagnosed as Pink Eye-requires to be on an antibiotic for 24 hours before returning to school
- Strep throat- requires to be on an antibiotic for 24 hours before returning to school
- **Sore Throat/Swollen Glands in Neck-** especially with fever (may be strep throat and should be seen by a healthcare provider)
- Chickenpox- child must stay out of school until all lesions have crusted over
- Frequent or persistent cough
- Frequent or persistent complaints of pain-child should be seen by healthcare provider
- **Green nasal discharge** child should be seen by a healthcare provider as this condition is sometimes contagious and may require treatment

Readsboro Campus Reminders:

- <u>Drop off</u> for children is between 7:45-8:15. We ask that drop off of students **does not** happen before 7:45. Thank You!
- **Bus Stop!** When the buses are parked and their lights are flashing, it is against the law to pass the bus, even if they are parked. The State Law for Vermont says, "Once the Red warning lights have been activated, you must stop your vehicle. Remember, even in a school yard, you must not pass a stopped school bus with its alternately flashing red warning lights activated". This is to help protect our children and parents from any accidents. Thank you for your cooperation with this.
